Instead of keen Sunday painter ("usually monitors and equipment, plus long, six-inch incisions, explains Constantinos, each operation involves three or four tiny punctures, about 5-10 mm. in length.

Through these he then inserts hollow metal tubes called trocars, each containing a surgical instrument (one of these instrumeats being the laparoscope). Then, on a TV monitor connected via computer to a camera in the laparoscope, the surgeon can see what's going on inside the patient's abdomen - and, by wearing a 'data glove' and mov ing his hands accordingly, he can move the instruments around, thereby carrying out the opera-

Once the instruments are in place, in fact, the surgeon's role is uncannily similar to playing a video game - which is why Constantinos believes the 'Nintendo generation', who've grown up with this kind of hand-eye co-ordination, will take to the system far more easily than members of his own generation have done the's given up playing his 12-year-old son at video games, he admits with a laugh: the kid's impossible to beat). Which is not to say laparoscopic techniques haven't made an impact - even in Cyprus, the vast majority of clinics and hospitals now have the equipment for all but the most advanced minimally invasive operations; bet it's also true that, within the older generation of medics, there opposition to their adoption.


